What is the purpose of this course?

Participants in the two-day Trainer Course learn Leave No Trace skills and ethics as well as techniques for educating others about these low impact practices. Trainer Courses take place over an initial Friday night session, all day Saturday sessions and a few hours on Sunday morning spending at least half of the course outdoors. Every Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scout unit should have at least one individual fully trained in Leave No Trace.

Who should take this course?

Safety Moment

Indoor Bodyflight



Safety Moment Summary:

So you want to take your first shot at an indoor bodyflight facility? If you're not prepared, you might be at risk for more injuries than you think. Bodyflight requires trained professionals to help you have the best experience possible in their facility, so it is recommended that you look up the activity requirements before you take off on your first flight adventure.

General Information:

If you are considering indoor bodyflight as an activity for your unit, district, or council, here are some tips to think about:

- Make sure to wear protective eyewear (safety glasses—with retaining strap or a full-face helmet) so you can see during your experience, and afterwards.
- Make sure to wear hearing protection—the wind tunnel can be quite loud due to the fans keeping you in the air. Protect your ears by wearing ear plugs and make sure your instructor checks they are inserted correctly.
- Wear shoes that are closed toe and closed heel. Flip-flops or lose-fitting shoes create a hazard for yourself and your instructor. Be sure you have shoes that will stay on your feet.

General Information:

- Loose items should stay out of the wind tunnel, including items in any pockets, necklaces, bracelets, etc.
- Think about your most recent medical exam. Be aware of restrictions that the facility has in place for bodyflight participants, which may include:
 - No history of neck, back, or heart problems
 - Body weight of less than 250 pounds
 - No shoulder dislocations or injuries
- Verify that the facility being used follows the standards of the International Bodyflight Association (IBA) and is listed in the IBA directory.
- Confirm that instructors are qualified through the IBA training program.

General Information:

- Release forms—As you will be exposed to up to 165 mph air velocity, parents should sign any required consents, releases, risk acknowledgments, or waivers of liability on behalf of their children. This is not a unit leader's responsibility.
- Unit leadership should not enter into contracts in the name of the unit, the council, or the Boy Scouts of America, nor can leaders or parents waive or release the rights of the council or the BSA.
- Good attitude—You may not have the same experience as your peers or be able to maneuver like the professionals, but remember, this takes many hours of training and certification. Have fun and, most importantly, be safe.
- These guidelines apply only to indoor bodyflight. Be aware that some related activities are unauthorized and restricted by the Boy Scouts of America.

Scouts BSA Roundtable Break-out Session – August 2023 Campfire Program Planning and Resources for Skits

Popular campfire programs include <u>Storytelling Campfires</u> where a variety of tales are shared; <u>Mystery Campfires</u> where the night is filled with surprises; <u>Educational Campfires</u> that present a guest speaker; <u>Court-of-Honor Campfires</u> that recognize achievements; <u>Stunt Campfires</u> that feature games and competition; and <u>Inspirational Campfires</u> with a spiritual or patriotic focus (flag retiring ceremony).

Elements of a Campfire Program

A campfire program is a gathering of Scouts, troop leaders, and family members for fun and fellowship. Despite its name, it doesn't have to take place at night, nor does it have to include an actual fire.

A successful campfire program includes four key elements:

- **Showmanship:** Great opening and closing ceremonies add some flair to your event and can include a creative way to light the campfire (if you're using one).
- Songs: Sing all kinds of songs, from silly Scouting songs to the National Anthem.
- **Stories:** Whether they're funny or scary, stories are a vital part of campfires.
- **Stunts:** Both <u>pre-planned and improvised skits</u> work great as stunts; invite some audience participation to make things really interesting.

Benefits

- There are numerous benefits to holding a campfire program. It gives every Scout the
 opportunity to participate in a group activity and potentially discover a new interest or talent.
 Even if they don't want to perform, they can be given a behind-the-scenes role, such as
 managing the props or holding the microphone for the Scouts with speaking parts.
- Campfire <u>programs give Scouts</u> a forum to practice their public speaking skills. Whether they are memorizing lines or ad-libbing, they will be learning how to speak in front of a group, which is a skill that will serve them well in adulthood.
- Scouts also have the chance to tap into their creativity as they plan their contribution to the
 campfire program. Some may want to strictly follow a pre-existing <u>script for a skit</u> or read a
 favorite story, but others will want to add their own personal touches in creating original
 writings and/or performing something they make up themselves.
- Whether outgoing or shy, there's a role for every Scout in a campfire program, so encourage everyone to get involved.

Length – generally a good campfire program lasts about 45 to 60 minutes. This is long enough to keep everyone's attention, but not so long that the Scouts become restless.

Though a fire isn't necessary, having one is helpful as "following the flames" can help you pace things. When the campfire flame is high, there should be lots of energy in your campfire; this is the best time for your audience participation songs and skits. As the fire burns down, the mood should come down, too.

Slower songs, calmer stories, and a short inspirational leader "minute" talk will wind down the campfire and naturally bring the event to a close.

Planning

There is no list of approved or prohibited skits for either the Boy or Girl Scouts. Instead, the Boy Scouts of America's website says, "Be sure that every feature of this campfire program upholds Scouting's highest traditions."
