- Cub Scout Updates
 - Effective 1 June, Family Packs have the option to form Family Dens to serve Kindtergarten (Lions) through 4th Grade (Webelos) scouts. 5th Grade (AOL) will remain single-gender dens to help prepare for bridging to a Scouts BSA Troop.
 - Effective 1 September, Packs will have the option of camping for two consecutive nights for unit-sponsored camping trips. Packs must continue to have at least one BALOO trained leader at each campout. Packs are limited to using council-approved camping locations.



District Commissioner Topics

- National Registration Fees Effective 1 August 2023:
 - Youth (Cubs/Scouts BSA/Sea Scouts/Venturing) \$80
 - Adult Volunteers \$60
 - Merit Badge Counselors \$25
 - Joining Fee \$25
- No Change in Council and Insurance fees for 2024
- No more proration of Annual Membership Fees beginning 1 August 2023
 - New youth and adult members will be enrolled for 12-month cycles
 - Individuals will receive email reminders to renew membership 60 days prior to expiration (Unit Leaders will be copied on emails).
 - Existing members will continue to renew membership at recharter through March 2024

What is the purpose of this course?

Participants in the two-day Trainer Course learn Leave No Trace skills and ethics as well as techniques for educating others about these low impact practices. Trainer Courses take place over an initial Friday night session, all day Saturday sessions and a few hours on Sunday morning spending at least half of the course outdoors. Every Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scout unit should have at least one individual fully trained in Leave No Trace.

Who should take this course?

- Scouts BSA, Venturers, and Sea Scout youth aged 14+.
- Adult Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, Venturing, and Sea Scout Leaders.
- District and Council Trainers, Commissioners and Leaders.

What will 1 learn?

- Concepts and methods that will advance your Leave No Trace knowledge!
- How to implement Leave No Trace in your unit's outdoor program and how they apply to the BSA's outdoor program.
- How to properly present the Leave No Trace skills to others. You will give a 10-minute presentation on an assigned Leave No Trace topic to increase your confidence to teach those skills to others!
- The Outdoor Ethics Awards and how you can earn them.

Charcoal Safety

Safety Moment Summary:

The day has come to an end and now your next adventure is cooking a cobbler for your evening dessert. Soon, you'll be ready to light a charcoal fire using your choice of approved Scouting equipment. However, when using charcoal, it is important to keep in mind that chemical fuels are not permitted for use in Scouting activities.



General Information:

- Lighting a charcoal fire without using a liquid or gel accelerant is possible. When you light charcoal in a chimney, it takes less time to prepare your briquettes and is a better way to control your fire output. Here are some tips for lighting your charcoal:
- Instant lighting charcoal (with or without a chimney)—This is probably the safest and most feasible for a Scout. Simply take a match to your charcoal assembly and watch it come ablaze.
- Starter cubes (with or without a chimney)—These are small blocks or cubes typically made of oil, wax, or quick-burning wood placed underneath your chimney or within your briquettes.
- Homemade fire starters (placed under chimney)
 - Cardboard egg cartons/toilet paper tubes/newspaper—Any of these will work as a fire starter. Place your briquettes or newspaper inside the carton slots where the eggs would sit or inside a toilet paper tube. Strike a match and light all corners or edges.
 - Processed corn chips—You read correctly. Processed corn chips are hydrocarbons (which burn) that are stored in fatty oil (which also burn). Much like starter cubes, you place the chips within and around your charcoal for best results and then light.



General Information:

Fire Safety Reminders

- Boy Scouts can earn the Firem'n Chit while learning to safely light fires.
- Follow manufacturer's product and safety instructions for chimneys.
- A knowledgeable adult should provide supervision when youth are starting or using fire.
- Start fires in a safe, outside area.
- Fires should never be left unattended.
- Thoroughly extinguish all fires after use.

2023 Updates

- Scouting's Barriers to Abuse
 - Two registered adult leaders (21+ years old) at all Scouting activities, including all meetings.
 - Must have a registered female leader (21+ years old) in every unit serving females
 - Notwithstanding the minimum leader requirements, age and program-appropriate supervision must always be provided
 - All adults staying overnight in connection with a Scouting activity must be currently registered in an adult fee required position or listed as an adult participant (Venturing and Sea Scouts)



2023 Updates

- Cub Scout Coordinated Camping
 - Packs may camp for 2 consecutive nights
 - Packs must camp at Council-approved camping locations – councils must make the list available to Packs
 - Parents/Legal Guardians may camp overnight with their scouts but must review the 'How to Protect your Children from Child Abuse: A Parent's Guide'.
 - Parent must be accompanied by a registered leader if they are with scouts other than their own child.
 - All other adults must be in an adult fee-required position.



Cubs Camping With Troops

- Webelos/AOL dens may camp at a unitsponsored Scouts BSA campout
- > All policies for each unit must be followed
 - Cub Scouts are restricted to camping at councilapproved locations
 - Cub Scouts must have a BALOO trained leader present at the event
- Webelos/AOL dens may attend Scouts BSA camporees as Day Visitors only




There are larger Troops and some smaller Troops who do it differently.

They travel in different transportation or use an old school bus or some do use a tour bus.

They tend to print up their own T-shirts for Jambo. Helps to identify the Scouts.

Saw some from CT, UT, PA, AK, etc.





Day Passes!

Advantages

- Cheaper (\$80 / day plus food, campground expense and spending money)
- Most Troops were able to drop the expense per Scout to \$600
- Food tends to be of higher quality according to Scouts

Disadvantages

SCOUTS OF AMERICA®

- Less time on site (In at 9 a.m., out by 4:30 p.m.)
- No Shooting Sports (Most Scouts did not see this as an issue)
- Restricted to Show Center (90% of activities are there)
- No concerts or zip lines



What do the Scouts think when using a Day Pass?

- Shooting Sports can be done back at their home Council
- Zip lines would be nice but you need to be in line to sign up by 7:30 a.m.
- There are so many activities to do that even 3 days is not enough to do all the activities in Show Center
- Some were there just to do patch trading (Thread Heads)
- All that I talked to enjoyed the Day pass.





Scouters can still go without the Troop!

We used an AirBnB with complete kitchen and cooked most of our meals. Oak Hill is really close to the Ruby Center to take the buses into the Summit. Our group of adults went up on Thursday, did Friday, Saturday and Monday, returned Tuesday. Lots of walking!

I got an extra Day Pass on Tuesday morning to do some woodcarving with Gary Dollar of Dollar-Burch bolos. No big deal. Excellent way to extend if needed.
